President's Message

As I write, we are approaching the official end of an academic year and the beginning of a new year on May 1. The 2022-23 year has seen St. Thomas More College (STM) move from a time of restricted on-campus learning into a new post-pandemic reality.

After two full years of pandemic disruptions, the return of students to the USask campus and our building was proof that university life was back. Enrolment in STM courses remained strong; student clubs began to rebuild their membership; and events on campus came roaring back in the fall. For the first time the College hosted a Round Dance and began a new tradition of the STM Annual Fall Gathering for alumni and friends.

In addition to new events and traditions, we completed some projects that will reshape our future work. After much reflection, we completed a new STM Catholic Identity and Mission Statement that builds on our Basilian heritage and embraces our relationships with the Diocese of Saskatoon and our Indigenous partners, as Pope Francis has called us to do.

The College completed a search for a new Librarian to lead the STM Shannon Library while also serving as an adviser to the Saskatoon Theological Union library. We are putting the finishing touches on a Mental Health and Wellness Strategy made by and for STM that will serve all members of our College community. And we reached out to survey more than 5,500 students registered in STM courses this past year to get to know them better and gather feedback on their academic and social experiences.

Along with our College Plan 2025 and our new Catholic Identity Statement, the results from the STM Student Survey will guide us when making decisions about the best use of our resources. While we were pleased to receive one-time government funding for critical building repairs, our operating grant will remain the same for the next two years while our costs increase. This scenario will require us to plan carefully and pursue new opportunities for funding. For that reason, we are developing a faculty hiring plan to map out where new faculty positions would go in order to meet student needs and grow the academic programs that are unique to STM, such as Catholic Studies, Social Justice and the Common Good, and Ukrainian Studies. This past year also saw the approval of a new Peace Studies Certificate program at STM that will be unique not only at USask, but in the province itself.

Along with disciplined planning and budgeting, STM is also increasing our activity in fundraising. In partnership with DCG Philanthropic Services, we are reinvigorating efforts to meet the fundraising targets for our Chair in Indigenous Spirituality and Reconciliation and the Dubé Chair for Catholic Studies. Recently, we reached out to almost 5,000 members of the STM community to find out how they engage

with us and whether they would join us in a campaign to build on and expand STM's strengths. I thank all those who responded to our survey and ask that all our alumni, donors, faculty, staff, and friends consider supporting STM as we continue to forge a path as one of the leading Catholic colleges in Canada.

With a clear sense of our educational mission and careful planning for the future, STM intends not only to weather the current financial pressures but to grow stronger by rising to the challenges of the times.

DEAN'S MESSAGE

It is hard to believe that another academic year at St. Thomas More College (STM) has come and gone. Although Covid-19 is still affecting our lives and there are always new challenges to work through (e.g., ChatGPT), this past year has certainly felt like we are finally 'back to normal.' For instance, for the first time since March 2020, most of our College activities and events this past year were held only in person. On April 11 we were able to gather as a community to celebrate the accomplishments and contributions of many of our staff and faculty at our annual STM President's Appreciation and Dean's Year End Reception - it was a wonderful way to complete the fall and winter terms.

There are a number of College achievements, initiatives, and events that have taken place since my last message in November that I wish to highlight. First, congratulations to Kylee-Anne Hingston McKechnie on the renewal of her probation, to Jennifer Briere for being granted tenure, and to Sarah Powrie on her promotion to Professor. Congratulations to Zachary Yuzwa for receiving a 2023 USSU Teaching Excellence Award and to Cynthia Wallace and Nadya Foty-Oneschuk for receiving a STM Teaching Excellence Award. There were a significant number of STM faculty nominated for these awards, which underscores the high quality of teaching that our students are receiving.

STM saw the development of three new courses (ARCH 498.3 Archaeology of Wood and Woodworking; PHIL 304.3: Aquinas Moral Political and Legal Philosophy; POLS 238.3 Global Ideologies in the 21st Century) as well as a certificate in Labour Studies, which is a collaboration between STM, Arts and Science, and the Edwards School of Business.

Sol Sanderson, an expert in Indigenous governance, inherent Indigenous rights, treaty rights, and the constitutional framework governing Canada's relationship with Indigenous peoples, gave a lecture in several of our classes this term (as well as a circle presentation to the College). Thanks to all involved in these wonderful opportunities for our students.

Despite the toll that the pandemic had on faculty's research productivity, they continue to receive grants, and publish reports, articles, and books. Several of us were able to celebrate the research accomplishments of our STM faculty on April 6th and to hear Sharon Wright read from her new book, Everyday Magicians: Legal Records and Magic Manuscripts from Tudor England, co-authored with Frank Klaassen. The Fransaskois Participatory Research Collaborative has recently been approved by USask's Vice-President Research, and the Collaborative is only a few steps away from officially establishing its presence on campus. Special thanks to Henri Biahé and Daniel Regnier for their leadership on this initiative.

We are also very proud of our STM community members recognized with the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal. This medal recognizes outstanding Saskatchewanians who have contributed to a strong, vibrant society and province through their service, contributions, and achievements. Congratulations to David McGrane, Fr. Andre Lalach, and Carl Still.

STM's two Centres have also been very busy over the past few months. In January, the Irene and Doug Schmeiser Centre for Faith, Reason, Peace, and Justice hosted the screening of the film *The Letter*, in partnership with the Laudato Si' Movement Canada and STM Campus Ministry, as well as the De Margerie Ecumenical Lecture, Forming Agents of Reconciliation for Church and World with Bishop Bruce Myers, Anglican Bishop of Québec City. The Centre also partnered with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon, St. Andrew's College, and Jesuit Refugee Services to host Journey into Exile, a series of workshops on refugee experiences. The Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage (PCUH), together with the Ukrainian Students' Association, brought the traveling



exhibit "Unissued Diplomas" to the STM campus this month. This exhibit uncovers the very touching stories of 36 Ukrainian students killed in the war and will be shown in over 45 universities worldwide.

STM students and student organizations continue to be very busy. The latest issue of in medias res, entitled "Horizon," was launched on March 29, with five students reading their work to an appreciative audience. It was great to see the enthusiasm of the student contributors. Many students also gathered for an end of year celebration on April 1. Enthusiastic karaoke singers and energized bingo players brought student engagement to a post-pandemic level.

As we finish this academic term, many STM faculty will now turn their attention to completing the numerous administrative and research-related tasks on their to-do-lists, while many students seek employment and/or further course work. We look forward to spring convocation ceremonies in June and the STM faculty staff-retreat in August. Finally, please mark your calendars for the Academic Mass that will take place on September 13, 3:30 p.m. (during the week rather than the weekend). We would truly love to see you there as we celebrate the beginning of another academic year together as a community.

Students, faculty, and alumni can nominate any instructor teaching in the current year, who is then invited to submit an application package, including student and peer reviews of teaching, a teaching portfolio, and a CV. Cindy is an Associate Professor and English Department Head at STM, where she has shared her love of teaching for just over a decade. A recipient of the USSU Teaching Excellence Award in 2019-2020 and a past nominee for the STM Teaching Excellence Award, she is a consistently devoted educator who is recognized by her students as compassionate, kind, challenging, and always willing to put in the work required of good mentorship. Speaking of mentorship, she also has a long record of graduate supervision.

Cindy is a busy and productive scholar. In her service work for the College and the community, she has contributed to the enrichment of teaching and learning for individuals of all ages and various walks of life. Her work often weaves mentorship and faith together, and in so doing it brings STM's Mission and Vision alive.

WINNER (Term and Sessional): NADYA FOTY-ONESCHUK

Nadya is well known to teaching award adjudication committees here on campus, having won the USSU Teaching Award twice (in 2011 and 2017) and having been nominated for the STM Teaching Excellence Award six times in the past decade for her work in teaching Ukrainian Studies and Anthropology courses. In her 13 years of teaching at STM and the USask, she has taught a variety of courses and her students emphasize the great thought and care that she puts into teaching and evaluation, particularly in her language classes. She has also contributed to pedagogical enrichment at the College by serving as Programme Coordinator for the Spring Session in Ukraine and Chair of the Ukrainian Studies Minor Advisory Committee.

In her statement of teaching philosophy, she shares that "The ongoing war in Ukraine, though a living nightmare in every sense, has renewed my passion for teaching in this area. I have been given an opportunity for gratitude on many levels, including gratitude for being able to open up this part of the world and its awe-inspiring people and their culture for my students; the very culture and language that they are, at this very moment, dying to protect." She also emphasizes that "The pivot Ukrainian educators around the world have had to accommodate in the last year has had a momentous impact on how, and more importantly, why we do what we do."

now selects two distinct award winners; one who is a sessional instructor, and another who is a faculty member. We received 33 nominations across both categories! This is remarkable for a college of our size, and a testament to the high quality of instruction here. Consequently, the committee looked through 3,000 pages of submitted material before deliberating on who would win the awards.

HONOURABLE MENTION (Tenure and Tenure-Track): HENRI BIAHÉ

Henri's application package detailing his work at STM as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultural Studies included page after page of evidence that he is anything but superficial in his approach to teaching and the student experience more broadly.

"Why do I teach?" asks Henri in his statement of teaching philosophy. He goes on to say, "I believe that having a superior command of a subject matter does not make a great teacher. For me, teaching is about how my students will feel and see themselves after they have left my classroom. As an educator, I want to leave a lasting teaching legacy for my students. I want to be remembered as an instructor who made his students feel as though they could accomplish anything that they set their minds to." Indeed, his commitment to knowledge, empathy, patience, care, and inspiration is evident in testimonials from his Henri Biahé students and his peers.

You have broadened your sense of identity as well as your sense of responsibility to each other and society while obtaining your liberal arts degree. You have developed the four C's



The Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal (QPJM) (Saskatchewan) was created to celebrate the 70th anniversary year of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's Accession to the Throne, which began on February 6, 2022. The Medal recognizes outstanding Saskatchewanians who have contributed to a strong, vibrant society and province through their service, contributions, and achievements. Medals were awarded at ceremonies held throughout the province during the Platinum Jubilee year ending on February 23,2023.

Service to community hallmark of Rupcich sisters

It was 60 years ago that Margaret Rupcich-Ludlow earned her degree from St. Thomas More College.

After a lifetime of furthering her education, teaching high school, and consistently offering her time to her community, the alumna of the Class of 1963 was honoured recently with the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal.

Margaret, who was known as Peggy Rupcich during her years at STM, was recognized in her home community of Dartmouth, NS. for her generous volunteer work in her parish, locally and even internationally.

The commemorative medal was presented in honour of the 70th anniversary of Queen Elizabeth II's succession to the throne. It is awarded in each province to residents who have made significant contributions to Canada and their home province.

The Rupcich family can actually lay claim to two of the prestigious medals.

Peggy's sister, Ellen Schmeiser (Rupcich) – also an STM alumna – was awarded the honour in Saskatchewan in 2022 for her lifelong work in from Saint Mary's University. the legal profession and as an advocate for human rights.

"Also, of course, the Sunday morning Mass, and the breakfast gathering that we used to have. And it was just a place to hang out, really, for us Catholic students."


While she does sometimes miss the wide, open skies of the Prairies, Peggy is very happy in Nova Scotia where she has been for more

In 2012, philanthropists Leslie and Irene Dubé donated \$1 million to establish the Leslie and Irene Dubé Chair for Catholic Studies.

In addition to serving students through high quality scholarship, the Chair will be an important and accessible resource for the broader Catholic community including Dioceses and Eparchies, Catholic schools and hospitals, Catholic and secular media, parishes, religious organizations, and individuals.

The scholarly work and leadership of the Chair will help distinguish the College's Catholic identity and strengthen its reputation as a leader in Catholic higher education in Canada. We have raised \$2.5 million towards our goal to fully fund the Chair.



The Chair will serve as an important forum for learning and respectful dialogue fostering the reclamation and elevation of Indigenous spirituality.

The hope and vision for the Chair in Indigenous Spirituality and Reconcialition is that it will set an example and build a model for implementation across the country. We have raised \$1.5 million to date toward this Chair.

Organized by the Newman Centre, the annual retreat offered three days of reflection, relaxation, prayer and process. The retreat included sessions reflecting on participants' journeys: in life, in faith, through the pandemic, and at university.

Newman Centre Executive members invited the STM Campus Ministry team to provide presentations on pilgrimage, prioritizing and prayer throughout the weekend. The weekend's theme, "The Return of the Retreat" allowed participants to reflect on how, during the past three years, we have moved forward and back, and made advances and returns. It was definitely a return to the tradition of travelling to St. Peter's Abbey for a weekend of faith, friends and fun...in January! The three days in Muenster were a time to get away from the regular day-today routine, and to have some time to rest, reflect and pray. After spending two years in the small city of North Battleford during the pandemic, I was eager to get involved and integrate myself into the campus community. The St. Thomas More community was a welcoming environment that has been a great addition to my student experience. Furthermore, my involvement in the STM Peer Health Mentors program has provided me with wonderful opportunities to share my passion for mental health awareness.

As the only practicing Catholic in my family, I often struggled to continue in my faith. Most of my childhood friends who grew up Catholic did not continue in their faith as they grew older. As a result, my hope for moving to Saskatoon was that I would find a Catholic community where I could continue to deepen my faith.

STM chapel was the perfect place to do this. Due to its smaller size and convenient location, I was able to meet new people, lead the music ministry, and go to mass regularly. Everyone was extremely welcoming and open to talking about their faith. The loneliness I had felt in my faith journey was remedied by participating in events such as having pizza after mass and talking with campus ministers. A recent event I've been holding is "A Mindful Moment", which is a 30-minute session with a short discussion about mindfulness and a 10-minute guided meditation. Being an STM Peer Health Mentor provides me with a safe space to be myself, be creative, and help others. 





Paulette Hunter, SHRF Research Connections Grant, "Developing a website to mobilize knowledge in support of palliative and continuing care". \$10,000. 2023-2024. This website will share the work of the Care Collaboratory, a research team based at St. Thomas More College at the University of Saskatchewan. The website will help them communicate their identity, values, approach, and work with healthcare stakeholders in the community.

Jeongeun Park is a co-researcher on an AKS (Academy of Korean Studies) Laboratory Program Grant for Korean Studies for a project titled "The Layers of Korean Buddhism: Dynamics of its Ideals and Practice in Chosŏn and Colonial Korea." This research will explore the dynamics of ideals and practice that unfolded in Korean Buddhism including the changes surrounding monastic families and clerical marriage, challenging prevailing assumptions about matters of monastic code. The project will run from 2022-2025 and the project director is Dr. Nam-lin Hur of the University of British Columbia.

Many Hands Needed for a New Start



Many hands make light work, as the saying goes. And when a hand is needed, folks at STM are guick to lend it. Nearly a year ago, the Mennonite Central Committee reached out, asking for volunteers to help resettle an Afghan refugee forced to leave his home when the Taliban took control of his country. Gertrude Rompré, Kari and Paul Sinkewicz, Kylee-Anne Hingston, and Linda Huard formed the group Many Hands, getting together to see how they could help Lutfullah start over in Canada.

As newbies to the work of resettlement, there has been a steep learning curve and challenges to overcome for the group. While there are many exceptional supports for services, like Global Gathering Place and Saskatoon Open Door Society, following the proper channels can be confusing and arduous. Waiting has been one of the toughest challenges- waiting on one form to complete another, waiting to hear about available services, etc. The group also had significant waiting to do regarding Lutfulllah's arrival. In July 2022, Lutfullah was on the runway, ready to leave Pakistan to journey to Canada, when the flight was cancelled. It would take until the end of October before he would arrive at the Saskatoon airport.

As long as the wait felt for the team, it must have felt much longer for Lutfullah, who is ambitious and hardworking. Back in Afghanistan, Lutfullah had begun a non-profit focusing on the environment and the rights of women and girls. He is also a talented juggler and participated in international competitions. Further, using his performance and artistic skills, he worked with orphans in Cambodia, teaching them to paint and juggle. Lutfullah also holds a degree in computer science. He now works for the Boys and Girls Club, and is looking to advance his education.

Participating in the resettlement process has given the team insight into the obstacles that newcomers experience. Seeing firsthand a life interrupted, the struggle to start over with limited resources, and the barriers that inhibit momentum, generates empathy. If more people could reflect on the life-altering situation refugees experience in their new country, perhaps they would offer more patience to people trying to make their way in a foreign place. Many newcomers are overgualified for the jobs they end up working because their skills and training aren't recognized. Until more is done to rectify this, it will remain difficult for newcomers to reach their potential in their new communities.

With the arrival of spring, it is a time for hope, and there is hope in knowing that many hands are contributing to making Saskatoon a welcoming place. Many Hands looks forward to introducing Lutfullah to friendlier weather and a Saskatoon summer full of new experiences.

Many Hands is a volunteer group made up of coworkers from STM. One of the current challenges Many Hands faces is the rising cost of living depleting the money meant to last for Lutfullah's first year in Canada. If you'd like to lend a hand, donations would be greatly appreciated.

Ecumenical and multifaith engagement is a vital way we as a Catholic College show our hospitality and commitment to the Gospel and example of Jesus, who prayed that we may all be one (John 17:21). It is an ongoing process, the fruits of which we will also see this coming June 20th-22nd in the conference decolonizing our churches, re-weaving our lives: experience, reflection, transformation – a joint effort between STM and the STU.
