



St. Thomas More College (STM) Learning Community Student Mentors

Description of the position:

STM student mentors are returning declared STM students with a proven record of academic success and engagement with STM student organizations or community service-learning. These students have unique potential to assist new first-year students make successful transitions to university life and learning. STM student mentors are the primary facilitators/instructors of the College's first-year learning communities. A flexible curriculum plan will be provided and there will be a training session. Student Mentors will be supported throughout the term by Student Services, Campus Ministry, and Engaged Learning staff at the College.

Time Commitment:

Approximately 6 hours of training and curriculum development over the summer. Schedule TBD.

An average of 2.5 hours per week for at least 10 weeks during the fall academic term (September through November). The weekly breakdown will normally be 1 hour per week in the LC with students, and up to 1.5 hours for preparation and administration.

Total estimated commitment over the entire period is 31-35 hours.

We are currently planning for one LC on Wednesdays at 12:30-1:20 PM starting on Sept. 8th, and another on Thursdays 1:00-1:50 PM starting on Sept. 2nd

Number of Positions Available:

STM is seeking to hire up to four student mentors for two first-year learning communities.

Compensation:

This position is paid an honourarium of \$500 at the end of the Term.

Supervision:

Student mentors report to the Manager of Student Experience and Enrolment in the Student Services Department.
